Editorial

Once again the editorial supervision of the "Victorian" has been changed. The last two issues of the magazine were produced and edited by J. Kay and A. J. McGill, and we congratulate them on the success which they achieved. This year, however, they are heavily engaged in preparing for the Higher Leaving Certificate, and the editorship has returned to a member of the teaching staff, assisted by two neophytes of Form IV, M. Nixon and L. McGavon, who are being trained for full editorship at some future date.

We had expected at the end of last summer term that we should soon be seeing preparatory work being carried out for the new school buildings, but as the summer wore on we who were in residence at the school saw no sign of the expected hordes of workmen and contractors. Later on we learned that for various reasons, mainly financial, the new building had been postponed for twelve months, and that the new school block would be radically different in design and siting from what we had been told. As so often happens at the end of one term and the beginning of another, we say farewell to old friends and welcome new friends. Major Baker, so long Housemaster of Wavell House, has been posted to Singapore. The latest news we have of Major and Mrs Baker is that they are both well, and we hope that they continue to be so. In Major Baker's place we welcome Major and Mrs Batchelor and Simon. We hope that they will find their sojourn here pleasant and profitable and we have no doubt that Wavell House will benefit from Major Batchelor's care and attention. We notice that Simon has quickly made friends with the junior boys, and is attending Dunblane Primary School.

We also welcome Captain Petrie as an additional member of the teaching staff, concerned with the teaching of Mathematics. Captain Petrie's keen interest and active participation in games will add to his usefulness in the school. Details of these officers' previous careers will be found on other pages of the magazine.

Another newcomer to welcome is Drum Major A. K. Morrison, late of the Scots Guards, who takes the place of Drum Major D. P. Legg. Without pretending to any technical knowledge of drumming, we think that, judging from what we hear, the previous high standard of drumming in the past will be maintained. Miss Barnett, our Housekeeper, left during the summer holidays and her place was taken by Mrs Davidson, whom we also welcome.

It is with great regret that we have to announce the departure, at the end of this term, of Miss MacLeod, the Hospital Matron. During the comparatively short time that Miss MacLeod has been with us, boys and staff have come to know of her never-failing kindness and compassion, and to know also that no call on her professional skill would remain unanswered. We wish her all good fortune in the future, and she may rest assured that all who have come in contact with her will regret her departure.

Shortly after the beginning of this term the dreaded word "mumps" was whispered along the corridors and in the dormitories. Boys began to disappear from the classrooms and to appear in the school hospital. An epidemic was feared, and the medical staff and House Matrons made due preparation. Fortunately, the threatened epidemic did not materialise, and by now all is well. The mumps, however, interfered with games, and several rugby matches had to be cancelled, much to the disappointment of the school teams. Four members of our 1st XV—

Wilkie, Leitch, Walker and H. Miller—were selected for trial with Midlands Schools, and Wilkie was selected for the Midlands School XV, but an unfortunate accident prevented his playing. H. Miller was travelling reserve for the same game.

At the time of writing, our minister, Mr Jamieson, has succumbed to an attack of chicken pox, the infection having been carried to him by his own children! Some time ago, when the school was struck by another mumps epidemic, Mr Jamieson fell a victim to this sickness, which is usually associated with the young. Mr Jamieson's doctor enquired indignantly what Mr Jamieson's mother must have been thinking of not to have allowed, or indeed encouraged him to catch these illnesses while he was a child.

Owing to the mumps, the half-term holiday was cancelled, but compensation is forthcoming in that the term will end four days earlier. Hallowe'en was celebrated in the usual way with a bonfire, fireworks, "tumshie" and "apple dooking" competitions, and a gargantuan tea. Haig House won the "apple dookin'" and Cunningham House carried off the "tumshie" prize.

This term is drawing to a close, and thoughts are turning to the inevitable end-of-term examinations, and also to the delights which follow these examinations—Christmas holidays. It only remains for the editor to thank all those who, willingly or unwillingly, contributed articles to this issue of the magazine, and to wish all his readers, young and not so young, a Happy Christmas.

GRAND DAY 1960

Tradition took a fair dunt at Queen Victoria School, Dunblane, last week. Grand Day was the sixth instead of the fourth day of the week; rain, repeat rain, actually fell; and the school chimney belched its pall not to spread over the playing-fields, but to be dispersed over the square by a spasmodic nor'wester. But though so battered, tradition gained the day through the Victorians' refusal to be put one step out of their immaculate stride.

Proceedings began in the play hall, where the presentation of academic prizes by the Lord Justice Clerk, Lord Thomson, one of H.M. Commissioners for the school, was preceded by the report of the headmaster, Lt.-Col. A. L. Fowler.

Col. Fowler summarised the scholastic attainments of the school, and reported that, in the Scottish Leaving Certificate examinations, as he had forecast a year ago, they had not had many entries. Six boys had entered for 35 subjects and had gained 33 subject passes. Nine of these passes had been at higher level, and four of them had been gained by the school Dux, Donald MacIennan.

At Junior Secondary Certificate level sixteen boys had been presented and twelve had passed the examination. Five boys had entered for the Army Apprentices examination, and all had passed; two who had entered for the R.A.F. Apprentices examination had failed, but one of them had passed as a boy entrant and the other had been under age for acceptance as a boy entrant.

The school's biggest academic success of the year had been its entry for the Perth and Kinross promotion examination in which 36 boys had been entered and gained a high proportion of passes—fifteen at "A" level, five at "B," fourteen at "C," and two at "D."

At the Army arts and crafts exhibition in

London this year, the school had been awarded the prize for the best junior unit in Britain. This very fine effort on the part of the boys had resulted in their capture of four first, three second and two third prizes for exhibits.

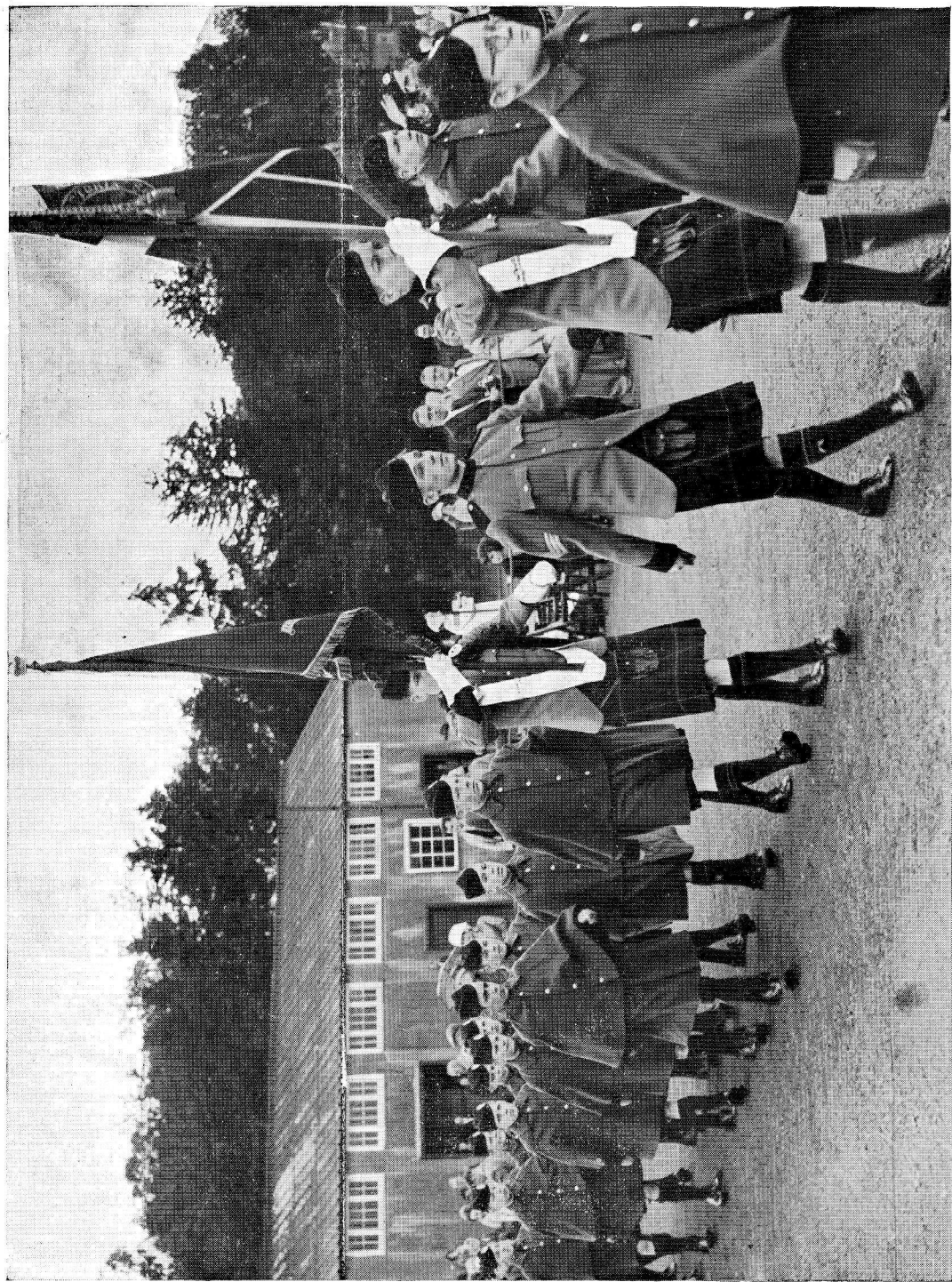
One former member of Q.V.S., said Col. Fowler, had gained the degree of B.Sc., and another the M.A. at St. Andrews University, while two others had been awarded diplomas at Glasgow School of Art. Another former pupil had been commissioned as a pilot officer (navigator) in the R.A.F.

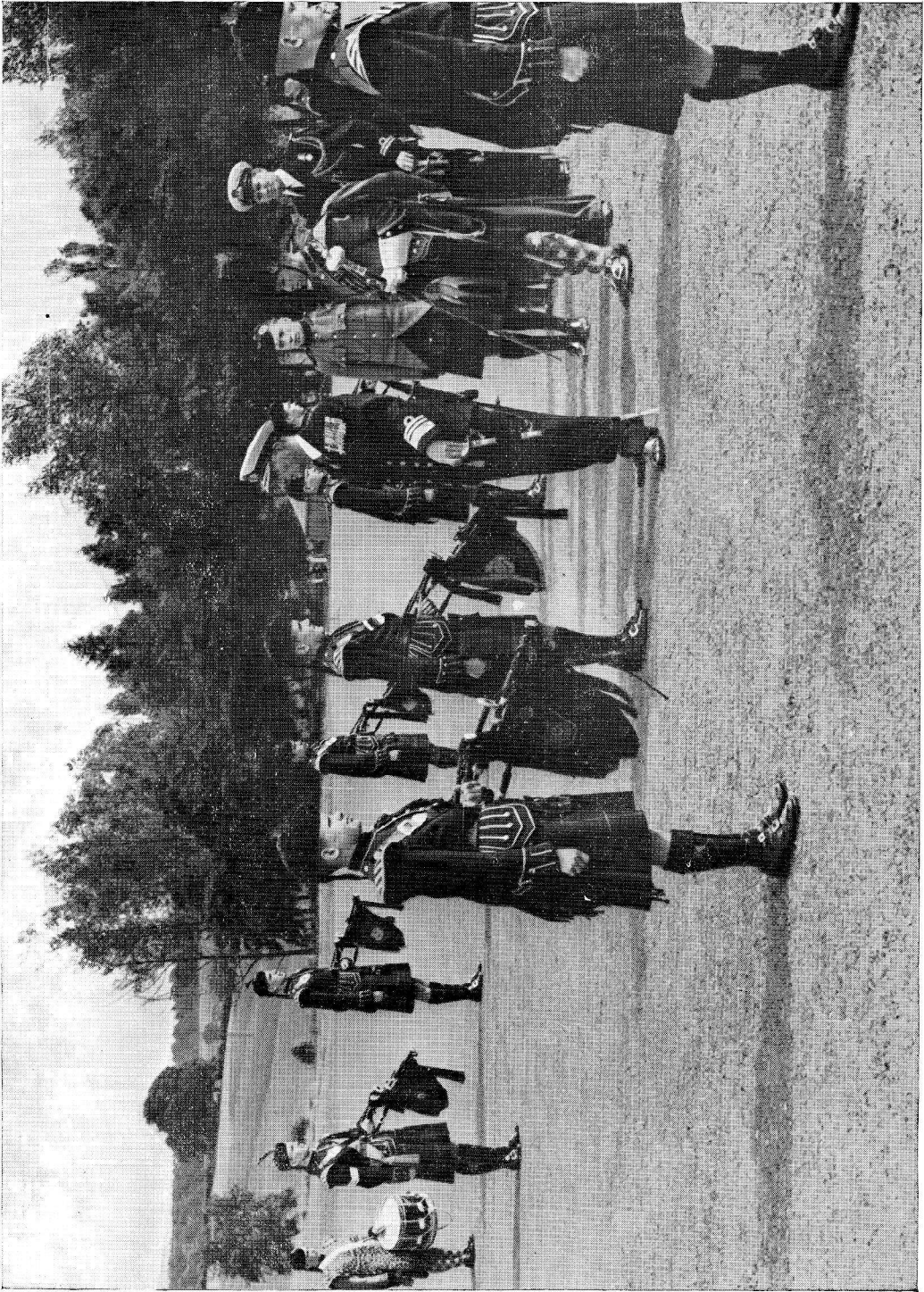
The headmaster had earlier said that the keyword of the school year had been "preparation." Perhaps the future was looked to a little too often in the field of education; and while they were planning for some wonderful Utopia they were inclined to lose sight of present ills. However, a boy could not be thought about in the present tense, he had to be thought about in terms of what he was going to become.

A lot had been said about the new buildings to be added to the school. It was hoped that a start on the work would soon be made. In order that the boys may be given an even flow of education it was planned to go to Cultybraggan Camp, near Comrie, during building operations, where they hoped the boys' studies would not be greatly interrupted.

Those parents who had heard exaggerated stories of over-specialisation in education had his assurance that at Q.V.S. they did not intend dropping any subjects from the curriculum. More and more boys had expressed the desire to enter Army and R.A.F. Apprentices' schools, and the demands of this school were a good working knowledge of English, science and technical subjects. Co-operation between parents and teachers was essential if the boys were to be taught satisfactorily, and while it

was impracticable to have a parent-teacher association here, they could keep in touch by letter.

He then turned to the subject of sport, specially swimming. There were 208 boys on the roll, and there was no boy in the school who could not swim. Life-saving certificates had been gained by 64 of them.

Lord Thomson, while congratulating the prizewinners, had words of consolation and encouragement for those who had climbed no higher than the middle, and they that remained at the bottom of the class. There were Napoleon (42nd out of 48 in his class) and Sir Winston Churchill (firmly anchored to the foot of his) to ponder on.

Before half-past three the school was mustered on the square in three guards behind the Colours. Well before the appointed hour of arrival of the inspecting officer, Vice-Admiral R. H. Wright, C.B., D.S.C., R.N., Flag Officer Scotland, the caped and kilted Victorians were marching down on to parade on the playing-fields, where their pipes and drums already were playing at the halt.

Spectators were generally fewer than usual. The combination of inclement weather and the close proximity of Glasgow Fair may well account for some of the sparsity. There was reasonable evidence for supposing that neither rain nor holiday fever but only Anno Domini, had caused the slight reduction in the ranks of South African War veterans.

As soon as the parade drew up in line, khaki capes were doffed and the Victorians stood resplendent in their scarlet tunics. The Admiral was late, but the wait did not weary them nor the rain disturb (to all outward appearances).

The inspecting officer contrived to arrive nicely between showers. Senior Monitor H. B. Johnston called the parade up to a General Salute, presented the Victorians to Admiral Wright, and conducted the inspecting officer on his tour of the ranks. Brig. A. M. Finlaison accompanied the Admiral's aide, and Col. Fowler also was in attendance, while tradition found another stalwart in the person of the Commandant's Boy, J. Mackenzie, who performed his drill to perfection.

Not until the inspecting officer had mounted the dais, and the march-past was in full stride, did the rain return. And how it poured. But not a man flinched in this miniature wet review. As Admiral Wright began his address the downpour developed into a deluge, and the ranks stood fast as he commended their turn-out, comportment and drill. They remained statue-like while he told them that choosing the right job was half the secret of a happy, successful life, and that taking a pride in one's work was the other half. Nothing more than brighter gleaming eyes greeted the Flag Officer Scotland's invitation of a busload of Victorians to visit Rosyth afloat and ashore.

Mrs Wright presented the fifteen principal awards, and in turn received from the hands of Boy David Jagger a bouquet of summer blooms.

Still the rain teemed, but could not drown the two hundred voices raised as one when

S.M. Johnston called for three of the best for Admiral and Mrs Wright. And then the Victorians re-formed in line and marched off, headed by the pipes and drums sounding "The Jubilee," pacing over the soggy turf as precisely as if it had been a sun-soaked esplanade. Not since 1933 has Grand Day been rained on, and only once (1926) has the parade been abandoned on account of the weather.

The sun later looked on displays of Highland dancing and physical training, and on the beating of Retreat. Pipe-Major J. McL. Sanderson, C.S.M. J. Mortimer (dancing instructor) and Mr G. Reid (P.T. instructor) could be proud as they or their predecessors had ever been—so tradition scored again.

This year's exhibition of art and craftwork in the band room was another facet of Grand Day that came up (at least) to expectation. T. Gavigan more than emulated his elder brother Keith, by capturing the senior art prize; and his pictures, and those of A. Whyte (second prizewinner for woodwork, too) showed unmistakable signs of talents that will bloom if nurtured with plenty of hard work. On every side, indeed, were examples of talent flourishing under thoughtful teaching, and evidence that even the least-gifted had been encouraged to use what they had.

NEW BUILDING PROGRAMME

We had hoped that the building of our proposed modernisation project would have begun in the autumn of this year, and had planned to move out to Cultybraggan Camp, near Comrie, for the whole of the summer term of 1961, in order that the alterations to the main block could be carried out in time to allow us to come back to the finished product at the beginning of next Christmas term. Things have not worked out that way. When the costs of the project as originally planned were worked out in detail they came to so much more than the original estimate that some radical variation has to be made if we are to get what we want within the money which is likely to be available. The architects have therefore now produced a new plan which instead of having the academic classrooms, technical classrooms and Wave's dormitories each in a separate block at various places in the grounds now concentrates all three in one long block three storeys high stretching the whole length of the parade ground from opposite the sewing-room nearly up to the hospital. This will save a great deal of expense by having everything under one roof and by avoiding the need for all sorts of approach roads and expensive mains and sewers. The Commissioners have approved the new plan which, in general, apart from also being cheaper, probably has more advantages than disadvantages when compared to the original scheme, but the inevitable result is that everything has been put back by one year. We hope now that building will begin in the summer of 1961 and that we shall move out to Cultybraggan at Easter, 1962, and come back to our finished modernised school towards the end of September of that year.

THE VICTORIAN

MAJOR R. E. BATCHELOR, M.A., R.A.E.C.

Major Batchelor was educated at the King's School, Peterborough, and St. John's College, Cambridge. He was commissioned in the Royal Engineers early in 1945 and served in India and Burma with the Bengal Sappers and Miners.

Major Batchelor returned to St. John's College in 1947 to read History and Geography. Four years later he re-joined the Army, this time as a member of the R.A.E.C. His first posting was as an instructor at the Army Apprentice School, Arborfield. From there he went in 1955 to H.Q. London District as S.O. II Education. In 1956 he was posted to H.Q. Northumbrian District as S.O. II Education, and in 1958 he went to H.Q. Singapore Base District as S.O. II Education, responsible for children's schools administration.

He joined the staff of this school in September, 1960.

Major Batchelor's athletic interests are mainly in rowing. While at Cambridge he rowed for his college eight, the Lady Margaret Rowing Club. His other interests are boat-building and carpentry.

CAPTAIN A. F. P. PETRIE, M.A., R.A.E.C.

One of the members of the school staff who has recently joined us is Captain Petrie.

He began his education at Buckhaven High School in Fife, taking a leading part in School sport, he captained the cricket team, playing as wicket keeper. He also captained the school golf team.

After leaving Buckhaven High School, he graduated from Glasgow University, while studying at Glasgow he played for the well-known amateur soccer team, Queen's Park, at inside left.

After leaving Glasgow University he joined the R.A.E.C., and was posted to Queen Victoria School where he now teaches mathematics.

DRUM MAJOR MORRISON

Drum Major Morrison left Q.V.S. where he had been boy Drum Major in 1945. He joined the Scots Guards, with whom he served for nine years, three of which were spent in Malaya. After this he returned to England for Royal duties between Buckingham Palace and Windsor Castle. He was then posted to Germany for service with B.O.A.R. from 1953 to 1957. He has toured France, Spain, Holland, Germany and Portugal with the Pipes and Drums of the Scots Guards Band; and on the last stage of service with the Band he completed a five months' tour of U.S.A. and Canada.

Drum Major Morrison has boxed for the Army and has won the Brigade of Guards Championship. He also boxed for London District, and as a boy he was runner up in the International Service Boxing in 1947.

There have been occasions of pomp and pageantry in Drum Major Morrison's Army career since he was in the Guard of Honour at the marriage of our present Queen, at the funeral of our late King, George VI, at the Coronation of our Queen and at the funeral of Queen Mary.

At nine o'clock on the morning of September 6th, 1960, undoubtedly the newest of new boys of Wavell House was the new Housemaster. This has been an unfortunate season to date. Four sets of fixtures have had to be cancelled due to mumps in the School. The result of the cancellations has been a lack of



match practice. We have tried to overcome this by playing inter-section games, e.g. 1st yr. 'A' XV against 2nd yr. 'B' XV; 2nd yr. 'A' XV against 3rd yr. 'B' XV. This has most certainly revived interest in the lower XVs, but in the senior school it is difficult to vary the XVs, due to lack of numbers.

1st and 2nd XVs

An outbreak of mumps at the beginning of the season (and one which has been most loyal since) has prevented us from playing some of our usual fixtures. Our games against Fettes College, Trinity College, Glenalmond and Strathallan School had to be cancelled.

So far this season, the 1st XV had played only four games of which we have won three. For the third consecutive year we lost to the High School of Stirling, but the score of 6 pts. to 3 pts. (a penalty kicked by T. Miller) made this the closest of our encounters with their 1st XV. Our three victories were over

Dollar Academy 2nd XV (away), Alloa Academy 1st XV (home) and the Old Victorians. Against Dollar Academy we won a hard fought game by 8 points to 3 points. At home to Alloa Academy we won a gruelling game in the mud by 5 points to 3 points. Our first game with the Old Victorians did not justify the excitement which had been building up during the term. Having failed to muster a complete side before the kick-off, the team was completed by four members of our 2nd XV. Although the team was considerably weakened by these last minute withdrawals the Old Boys fought hard and went down heroically by 39 points to 3 points. Fortified by some of the present 1st XV who will be going into retirement, a closely as well as keenly contested game is being anticipated next year.

We were compelled to make a number of changes in both XV's, during the season as more and more of the regular players were affected by mumps and throats. Thirty nine boys have played for one or other of the two teams and nineteen of these have had experience with the 1st XV. The forwards have been playing attractive rugby and more than held their own against bigger and heavier packs if only another 'prop' forward could be found to strengthen the front row this should prove most useful and successful scrum. The backs, however, have not been very happy and the best combination in the three quarter line has yet to be found.

Boys: A. Leitch, C. Walker, J. Wilkie and H. Miller — were chosen to play in the Midland District School's trial in October. After the game J. Wilkie was once again selected to represent the Midlands against Glasgow and District Schools and H. Miller was chosen as "reserve in attendance." Unfortunately J. Wilkie sustained an injury in the match against Stirling High School and failed to pass a pre-match fitness test.

Our 2nd XV have recorded three wins out of a possible four so far this season. They were completely demoralised when they visited Dollar Academy in the opening match and were beaten by 35 points to nil. With a stronger and fitter team they restored their confidence against Perth Academy (away) by 2 goals to 1 goal and a penalty goal (10-8). On their own ground they defeated a weak Scotus side by 28 points to nil. They followed this up by recording one of their best performances against Stirling High School (away) with an 18 points to 13 points win. Matches against Grangemouth, Alloa Academy and Rannoch School were cancelled. Colours—The Captain, H. Miller, has re-awarded colours to A. D. Leitch, C. C. Walker, J. W. Wilkie, J. A. Ross and G. M. D. Thomson. T. Miller has been awarded his rugby colours for the first season.

3rd XV—The third XV have had only one match, against Alloa Academy 3rd XV and in this they won quite comfortably. They play with spirit and enthusiasm but could improve by tackling low and running straight.

4th XV—Disappointingly few matches have been possible. The team started with two big wins against weak opposition, and then, after a long period without matches scraped home against Alloa with a last-moment try. Hesitation and unwillingness to tackle are the big weaknesses. It is still possible for any opponent of moderate size to run past five or six of our boys with no attempt to tackle him. In fact, we have twice had tries scored against us by single opponents running from their own goal-lines. There has been some good forward play, dribbling packing and heeling, and the backs have often passed and run well; but many opportunities have been lost by slowness and lack of thrust near the line. Nor have we a kicker. Of twenty tries scored in the two opening matches, mainly near or under the posts, only three were converted. T. McLaughlin must be mentioned again for outstanding grit and dash. His tackling of big opponents has contrasted with the weakness in this respect of our own big boys.

5th and 6th XV's (1st year)—This is a good section and have in practice showed the ability to learn all the skills of rugby and then in a match apply them. They have played one match against Alloa Academy and showed up as a XV with the ability to become a good team.

PRIMARY SCHOOL CAMP

The camp officially started on the 31st August when twenty-four eager but inexpensive campers assembled to spend the night at the school before travelling north in the morning, via Crieff and Aberfeldy, to Loch Rannoch. When we arrived on the site, we unloaded the trucks and soon set about putting up camp. The marquee was the first to take shape, followed by the store tent. We then put up our own tents, working in pairs. With our packed lunches hastily "tucked" away, and refuse and latrine pits completed, we changed and started to explore the area.

The camp routine was simple and two of the senior boys, J. Allan and D. Marshall were put in charge of the two parties formed. Each party had to supply two boys for kitchen duty each day. This consisted of preparing meals and protecting the store tent from "visitors." Drinking water had to be collected from the "Bar-racks" (the neighbouring mansion) and milk was "conveniently" left at the Post Office three-quarters of a mile away. Each boy was responsible for keeping his own tent and tent area clean and tidy and wood had to be collected for the nightly camp fires, but this was one of the more enjoyable tasks.

Each day started off with a wash in the neighbouring burn and each day most of us had to be recinded to 'strip to the waist.' On one occasion a few of us followed T. - - - for a swim in the crystal, clear water but only once! We preferred to postpone this luxury until later on in the day. Breakfast and the general duties completed we had a choice of climbing or remaining in the camp area to play games, both indoor and outdoor.

Our two highest climbs were Meall Buidhe (3,045 ft.) and Schiehallion (3,547 ft.), but only seven boys—Allan, Jagger, Murray, O'Connor, Welsh and the McNeill twins attempted the latter. A number of us had brought our rods along and most boys enjoyed a spot of fishing in the "all purpose" burns (we had a choice of two). The four "angling champions" were rewarded by a trip to a Garden Fete in Kinloch Rannoch where Allan won a goldfish, complete with water and bowl. Cricket, rounders and rugby were played most days with some new rules introduced to brighten up the play. These rules were rarely broken since the offender was penalised by being "bowled" into the burn. Mr Williams had rigged up "a rope bridge" across the river for our convenience and some of us succeeded in crossing it.

Our one really wet day was fortunately spent on a trip to Pitlochry and district which is reported elsewhere in this magazine. This trip, together with some visitors whom we entertained at camp, helped us to realise that we were still in contact with the outside world. Our visitors included Brigadier and Miss Finlaison, Major Acres and Mrs Jagger, Mr Hutcheson and Mr Hanes of Rannoch School and the Rev. Thomas Leighton of Kinloch Rannoch.

Our day invariably ended with a sing-song warmed by a roaring camp fire and a mug of soup of cocoa.
